1. OBJECTIVES

World Heritage Site Managers are the frontliners of the UNESCO 1972 Convention with responsibilities to conserve, protect and safeguard the Outstanding Universal Values of respective World Heritage Sites. We Are Site Managers International Symposium aims to promote the understanding of the functions, responsibilities, challenges and needs of Site Managers, to international organizations, state parties and the larger heritage-related communities. Leading Site Managers from around the world will be invited to George Town, Malaysia to discuss, debate and deliver their experiences in the field, and thus contribute to achieving the following objectives:

- a) To identify and define the roles, commitments and contributions of Site Managers for the UNESCO World Heritage System.
- b) To achieve the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals by engaging in an inclusive and meaningful community-based approach in the World Heritage Site Management through the "George Town Declaration".
- c) To facilitate opportunities for sharing of thought-provoking initiatives in all aspects of Site Managers' activities, including conservation, communication, development, education, best practices, innovative approaches, largest threats, and other day-to-day activities.
- d) To share the Site Managers' day-to-day needs, experiences, challenges, and opportunities with peers and stakeholders, thus creating international awareness and recognition of the function of Site Managers as the frontliners in World Heritage Site safeguarding and conservation. These experiences shall be incorporated and integrated as early as possible when key decision makers, including the World Heritage Centre of its advisory bodies, prepare capacity building courses, world heritage management guidelines or handbooks, or projects.
- e) To encourage dialogues between Site Managers with the international and national stakeholders on the perceptions and receptions of Site Managers in World Heritage Site Management, with the aim to reach pragmatic problem solving at site level.
- f) To create a more inclusive, supportive, pragmatic and integrated system at the local and international levels for Site Managers at UNESCO and its advisory bodies to effectively deliver the responsibilities in managing and conserving World Heritage Sites and in protecting the Outstanding Universal Value(s).
- g) To build a network of Site Managers.

- b) A publication with the title We Are Site Managers.
- c) A George Town Declaration.
- d) We Are Site Managers Network (WASM-Network).



12. CONGKAK CHAMPIONSHIP

Congkak is a traditional game often played as an indoor activity or as a competition in Malaysia. Players placed buah (game pieces) in the hollow perforated wooden planks. The main hole located at the left end of each player is the rumah (home), and the inline holes are kampung (village). Players start the game simultaneously by taking buah from the last kampung and place one at a time into subsequent kampung in a clockwise direction. The players can then choose any kampung to place the buah. The main goal is to put as many buah into the respective rumah. The player can "eat" the opponent's kampung if the last buah is located at the player's empty kampung. One's round ends when any buah stops in an empty kampung. Each player will continue the game until each kampung runs out of buah. A player with the most buah in their rumah takes the win. Come challenge our secretariat for this game. Winner of the game will receive a limited edition of GTWHI publication. One participant is limited to winning one gift during the symposium.

SESSION 3: SITE MANAGERS AND THE WORLD HERITAGE SYSTEM 11:30

The speakers will share the challenges that they face while carrying out their daily tasks as Site Managers, including fitting the World Heritage System in the local context, as well as the interpretation of the role of a Site Manager in both international and local management systems.

FILLING THE GAP: ENHANCING ROLES OF WORLD HERITAGE SITE MANAGERS Wei Qing (Director, ConserVision Consulting, China)

Despite being initially designated as pivotal in World Heritage Convention implementation, site managers are mentioned only seven times in each version of the Operational Guidelines since 2005. Unlike roles like stakeholders and local communities, where mentions have dynamically increased, this highlights a conceptual and rigid understanding of site managers' roles. There's a considerable gap between this conceptualized identity and their practical contributions. The article analyzes this phenomenon, suggesting necessary Operational Guidelines amendments to bridge this gap. It emphasizes the positive impact of site managers as a professional group in World Heritage Convention implementation.

THE FIFTH C IMPLEMENTED

Hege Agathe Bakke-Alisøy (World Heritage Coordinator, World Heritage Site of Bryggen, City of Bergen, Norway)

Site managers are placed in a challenging position between the World Heritage Convention with its Operation Guidelines and policy documents and local, as well as national, expectations of how the management system is best organised and structured. The local community is to be actively involved in the management of a World Heritage Site. How then to implement the fifth C, and thus the World Heritage Convention and its Operational Guidelines, into a local context? I wish to explore these challenges by discussing the management system at World Heritage Site Bryggen.

THE OFTEN MISUNDERSTOOD ROLE OF A SITE MANAGER

Nadya König-Lehrmann (Managing Director, Upper Middle Rhine Valley World Heritage Association, Germany)

The administration and management of a UNESCO World Heritage site places great demands on the management system and especially on the skills of a site manager. They are key figures in the system and must be true all-rounders with a wide range of qualities, personal strengths and communication skills. The tasks of managing a UNESCO site seem to be exotic and are often met with a lack of understanding. How can the activities of a Site Manager receive a better understanding by outsiders and also by the relevant government structures, departments and the decision-making bodies?

15:00 SESSION 5: I SERVED AT AN ENDANGERED SITE

This session invites Site Managers who are serving at World Heritage sites under threat to share their experiences in mitigating day-to-day challenges and their relationships with local stakeholders, state parties and international bodies.

EFFORTS AND CHALLENGES IN MANAGING THE HEBRON/AL-KHALIL OLD TOWN Nuha Dandis (Site Manager, Hebron/Al-Khalil Old Town, Palestine)

The Hebron/Al-Khalil Old Town is one of the oldest living historic centres in the world, located in the southern part of Palestine. It constitutes a continuous fabric which was built around Al-Ibrahimi Mosque. Hebron has been under Israeli occupation since 1967. formalizing a severe negative impact on the authenticity and integrity of the town, as well as on its citizens. Therefore, it was inscribed as a World Heritage in Danger. I will present the experiment of the Hebron Rehabilitation Committee in managing and conserving the property, highlighting day-to-day challenges and exploring the approaches to involve the local community in its management.

TOMBS OF BUGANDA KINGS AT KASUBI FROM DARKNESS TO LIGHT Denis Lukwago (Site Manager/Conservator-Architect, Tombs of Buganda Kings at Kasubi, Republic of Uganda)

The year 2001 under Decision 25 COM X.A; The UNESCO World Heritage Committee inscribed the Tombs of Buganda Kings at Kasubi on the World Heritage List under criteria (i), (iii), (iv), and (vi): On the 16th of March 2010, this Property's main building, "Muzibu Azaala Mpanga", was gutted by fire and the Site devastatingly lost its Outstanding Universal Value (OUV), and consequently the Committee Decision 34 COM 7B.53 recommended its inscription on the category of the Properties in danger until the adoption of the 45COM7A.25 accepting its inscription on the main list after ten years of implementing the various decisions.

MAKLI, A LIVING NECROPOLIS: PAKISTAN'S MAGNIFICENT NECROPOLIS Serfraz Nawaz (Assistant Archaeological Engineer, Makli Necropolis, Thatta, Pakistan)

Makli, located near Thatta in Sindh, Pakistan, is an extraordinary necropolis spread over an area of 912 acres in the region's rich cultural and historical heritage. Makli is home to a vast collection of uniquely designed mausoleums, tombs, and monuments, dating back to the 14th century. This UNESCO World Heritage property is a remarkable combination of various architectural styles, including Islamic, Persian, Central Asian, and Indian influences, reflecting the diversity of the Sindh region. The site offers a unique insight into the historical, artistic, and spiritual dimensions of the area, making it a destination of immense historical and cultural significance.

CONSERVATION AND MANAGEMENT OF THE SACRED ISLAND OF OKINOSHIMA AND ASSOCIATED SITES IN THE MUNAKATA REGION

Miki Okadera (Assistant Counsellor, World Heritage Division, Fukuoka Prefectural Government, Japan)

The Sacred Island of Okinoshima and Associated Sites in the Munakata Region is a Japanese World Heritage Site, with shrines and burial mounds as monuments with rich historical background. It is also a property of ongoing religious beliefs, and the involvement of people is essential for its preservation and management. Its property area includes a vast sea area and three islands within the property area, which contain many natural elements. By introducing this case, I would like to think about the role of the Site Manager and the conservation management of the World Heritage Site.

BRINGING COSMOLOGICAL AXIS TO THE WORLD: MANAGING CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

Dian Lakshmi Pratiwi (Head of Office, Cultural Office of Yogyakarta Province, The Cosmological Axis of Yogyakarta and its Historic Landmarks, Indonesia)

Yogyakarta is a melting pot of cultures which are derived from interchange between belief systems and values. One of its legacies is the placement of the landmarks along the Cosmological Axis which was designed to manifest the philosophical thought of human life. To preserve this legacy to the world, The Cosmological Axis of Yogyakarta and its Historic Landmarks submitted as UNESCO World Heritage and inscribed in 2023. It is located in the downtown area and has to deal with development, environmental, sustainable tourism and community pressure. It is also located under the territory of 3 different governments. Hence, the Management Unit has to cooperate with these governments to preserve this World Cultural Heritage.

09:00 SESSION 8: SITE MANAGERS IN ASIA (cont'd)

QUANZHOU WORLD HERITAGE CONSERVATION AND ITS COMMUNITY-BASED **PRACTICE**

Su Zhiming (Deputy Director, Quanzhou Maritime Silk Road World Heritage Nomination Center) and Shang Jin (Quanzhou City Cultural Promotion Ambassador, China)

On 25 July 2021, "Quanzhou: Emporium of the World in Song-Yuan China" was inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List, marking Quanzhou's entry into the world heritage cities community. The challenge then is how to further protect and transmit Quanzhou's world cultural heritage, especially considering the widespread distribution of 22 heritage sites throughout the city. Quanzhou has drawn its bottom line for heritage protection, and committed itself to the improvement of quality of life. Starting from the community, the city has issued "Codes for Care and Protection of Heritage", improved public discussion mechanisms for heritage protection, and encouraged the general public to safeguard, transmit, and interpret the world heritage collectively. All of these efforts contribute to Quanzhou's exploration of a model for community-based practice of World Heritage conservation.

GEORGE TOWN WORLD HERITAGE INCORPORATED AND WORLD HERITAGE SITE MANAGEMENT

Ang Ming Chee and Ting Siew Jing (George Town World Heritage Incorporated, Malaysia)

George Town Heritage City has been inscribed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2008. As part of a serial site with the Melaka Heritage City, George Town World Heritage Incorporated (GTWHI) was established as a Site Manager by the State Government of Penang. Functions as a Government Linked Company, and registered as a Company Limited By Guarantee in Malaysia, this presentation details the institutional design of the site management agency. I shall also share the management strategies, activities conducted, challenges faced and opportunities in World Heritage Site Management of this urban and multicultural site.

A site manager is responsible for the sustainable conservation and interpretation of his heritage attributes, being creative in remaining current and relevant. This involves management of allocated resources, prioritizing value for money in enhancing revenue generation. This is through keen staff coordination and expertise, capacity building, motivating and maximizing output potential. Over and above all, is the periodic reporting to higher agencies, keeping up with performance contracting while ensuring operational guidelines and management plans are still relevant. Locally the link with the community and relevance to youth is paramount. So, how many hats shall a site manager wear?

MANAGING WORLD HERITAGE: A SOUTHERN AFRICAN PERSPECTIVE Mags Pillay (Director, Fossil Hominid Sites of South Africa: Cradle of Humankind World Heritage Site Component, South Africa)

The institutional arrangements for the management of World Heritage properties the world over are often diverse and varied. How do sites function? How are site management plans developed and managed? What funding mechanisms are in place to ensure that authorities of sites are equipped with adequate resources to be able to safeguard the protection of the outstanding universal value of a site? A case study of a South African-inscribed World Heritage site will be explored to shed light on some of the challenges and opportunities that authorities of sites face in a Southern African context.

AN OVERVIEW OF THE SENEGAMBIA MEGALITHIC CIRCLES STONES

Seydou Nourou Kane (Manager, Stone Circles of Senegambia, Senegal)

Listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2006, the Megalithic Circles of Senegambia constitute a cross-border asset between Senegal and the Gambia. Spread over an area 350 km long and 100 km wide, a total of 1053 Circles on 1987 sites are today inventoried, four of which have been registered. These monuments form tombs which would have been used between the 3rd century BC and the 16th century AD. The large quantity of Circles is a unique manifestation of construction and funerary practices that lasted over a millennium over a wide geographical area, reflecting a productive and sophisticated society.

It investigates the dynamics between the site manager and stakeholders, evaluates challenges, and suggests contextspecific strategies for effective management in the future.

CO-MANAGEMENT, CONSENSUS OR CONFLICTS? DIFFERENT WORLD-VIEWS UPON MANAGEMENT

Åsa Susanna Margaretha Nordin (Site Manager, Laponia, Sweden)

Building a new management organization for a world heritage site, where there is no stated model for how it should be done, is a challenge; when the management of protected areas should be decentralized to a non-profit association. It was the interests of widely different ethnic groups that had to be united and sometimes it went smoothly and sometimes the whole organization was toppling because of different cultural backgrounds, different worldviews and different ideas how to interpret the management plan, etc.

CHALLENGES IN MANAGING THE WORLD HERITAGE 'HERITAGE OF MERCURY. ALMADÉN AND IDRIJA'

Tatjana Dizdarević (Director, Idrija Mercury Heritage Management Centre Slovenia)

To successfully implement the integrated management of UNESCO's 'Heritage of Mercury. Almadén and Idrija', Spain and Slovenia established in 2013 the International Management Committee which, in line with the Operational Guidelines for the Implementation of the Convention Concerning the Protection of World Heritage, acts as a coordinating body and manages the otherwise physically separated parts of the World Heritage property. The committee together with its members from various institutions represents a platform for the exchange of knowledge, experience and ideas. This can be seen in the numerous examples of cooperation on expert, scientific research, project and even promotional levels.

SITE MANAGER OF A COMPLEX PROPERTY IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

Vít Šnajdr (Site Manager, Kutná Hora: Historical Town Centre with the Church of St Barbara and the Cathedral of Our Lady at Sedlec, Czech Republic)

The lecture includes a brief introduction of the property, discussing its diversity and complexity with regard to its management. Five years of experience as a site manager in Kutná Hora will be presented. Emphasis will be placed on the development of this function in terms of municipality. It will point out the difficult position of the site manager in a property with around six hundred owners. Another issue to be commented on will be the absence of the institute of site manager in the legal system of the Czech Republic and the difficulties arising from this.

Russian legislation does not have a special section dedicated to World Heritage sites, which gives rise to a variety of options for managing sites. For single or natural objects, the managers, as a rule, are museum-reserves on whose territories the objects are located; for cities - special government bodies. A separate category of objects are objects with a religious component. The process of creating the Russian Association of World Heritage Site Managers is currently underway.

This session invites individuals who used to serve as Site Managers to share their experiences, gains and losses after moving to a new position, reflecting on how the past experiences have helped in their roles and what could have been done in their previous roles as Site Managers.

POLITICS, WORLD HERITAGE AND SITE MANAGERS: BEYOND THE CONSERVATION ENCLAVE

Pascall Taruvinga (Head of Department Anthropology, Rhodes University, South Africa)

Managing World Heritage sites now demands capacities and mindsets beyond conservation itself as different value propositions are emerging in the highly politicized context of these properties. Heritage is first and foremost local before becoming universal, implying it has varied meanings and value propositions to different constituencies, which often creates 'political minefields' for site managers. This paper explores the site manager's perspective on these issues in Africa and advocates building "bridges" connecting local and universal value propositions of World Heritage. These perspectives draw from past experiences as a site manager. Site managers cannot remain in the conservation enclave, nor continue theorizing stakeholder and their broader aspirations at World Heritage sites.

FROM FRYING PAN INTO FIRE: FROM SITE MANAGER TO CONSULTANT Letícia Maria Pereira Leitão (Cultural and Natural Heritage Consultant, Lausanne, Switzerland)

That Monday morning, I cried. The roof element that I considered a masterpiece of craftsmanship was forever gone and I knew the legal penalties would not be enforced because of lack of political will. Soon after I resigned from being the manager of the WH City of Angra do Heroísmo, in the Azores Islands (Portugal). I didn't know what I was going to do next but life had other plans: from Angra, I went to work at ICCROM and later with IUCN and ICOMOS. Twenty years later, I still use my past experience as a site manager as a filter for my work as an international consultant.

16:00 SESSION 11: I WAS A SITE MANAGER (cont'd)

IMPLEMENTING THE CAPACITY-BUILDING PROGRAMME FOR SITE MANAGERS: INTERNATIONAL AND NATIONAL

Hyein Oh (Programme Specialist, International Centre for the Interpretation and Presentation of World Heritage Sites under the auspices of UNESCO, UNESCO-WHIPIC)

This presentation compares my previous experience as a site manager with my current role as a Programme Specialist at a UNESCO Category 2 Centre and emphasizes the significance of capacity-building for site managers. Based on the implementation of capacity-building programmes in Korea and Africa, it is evident that site managers are one of the key stakeholders with both the ability and willingness to contribute to conservation efforts. If all stakeholders acknowledge the significance of heritage values and participate in the heritage meaning-making process, site managers will be able to connect with each other, develop mutual understanding and safeguard our heritage.

MULTI-TASKING AS A SITE MANAGER AT CHURCHES AND CONVENTS, OLD GOA, INDIA

Nizamuddin Taher (Archaeologist and Heritage Conservator, former Site Manager and presently advisor to Govt and Corporates on Heritage Matters, India)

The World Heritage Property at Old Goa is also a Protected Monument of India. As per the policy, experienced Resource Personals are posted at the site as Site Managers. Their duty profile apart from Management also includes Administration, Conservation, Curatorial and Archaeological Research, in which, Conflict Resolution and Networking amongst the Stakeholders being a major task. Hence, challenges faced to sustain the OUV would be communicated including Disaster Management i.e. Fire that happened at the Property. These would be elaborated through a Paper submission and an illustrated presentation. Including, the Archeological Research conducted at the site, leading to the discovery of the relics of the St Ketevan of Georgia. The same was handed over to their Govt.

MANAGING COMPLEXITY: SITE MANAGEMENT IN TIMES OF DYNAMIC PROCESSES OF CHANGE

Matthias Ripp (Site Manager, Old Town of Regensburg with Stadtamhof, Germany)

The article applies insights from multiple disciplines to urban environment studies and advocates for a systemic understanding of cultural heritage as a prerequisite for sustainable and resilient adaptation to current challenges. It also contributes to a body of knowledge on what skills cultural heritage professionals need to be competent and confident in their daily work. The case study provides some valuable examples from Regensburg of Germany by taking an integrated and holistic approach that views the city as a multi-layered system in cultural heritage management.

SITE MANAGERS' LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT SKILLS WITHIN WORLD HERITAGE FRAMEWORKS

Juliana Strogan (World Heritage Coordinator, Rjukan-Notodden Industrial Heritage, Norway)

World Heritage site managers must possess a diverse skill set to effectively oversee and preserve cultural and natural treasures in line with the World Heritage Convention. This article delves into crucial skills, competencies, and leadership styles aligned with global World Heritage frameworks. Examining key international documents, including the World Heritage Convention and the World Heritage and Sustainable Development Policy, it emphasizes embedding their principles into site management practices. Acknowledging the impact of technology, digital literacy is crucial for data management, but resource constraints pose challenges. Soft skills like diplomacy and design thinking are pivotal for addressing conflicts and crafting sustainable solutions. Ultimately, site managers must blend technical proficiency, diplomatic acumen, and innovative thinking to safeguard World Heritage in a changing world.

LAKE BAIKAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

Irina Aiurzanaeva (Environmental education specialist, Lake Baikal, Federal State Establishment "Zapovednoye Podlemorye", Russia)

Lake Baikal is the deepest lake in the world. It holds 20% of the freshwater of the whole planet. Lake Baikal is a unique natural and cultural heritage site. Around Baikal there are physical remains of our past – buildings, landscapes, old cities, and archaeological sites – and the intangible traditions of indigenous peoples. National parks, nature reserves and sanctuaries preserve its unique flora and fauna and provide outdoor educational activities for children and adults. Environmental education can raise awareness of issues impacting the environment upon which we all depend, as well as actions we can take to improve and sustain it.

IMPLEMENTING THE OPERATIONAL GUIDELINES IN A HISTORIC URBAN CONTEXT Natasha Kheddoo-Ramcharitar (Assistant to World Heritage Site Manager, Aapravasi **Ghat World Heritage Property, Mauritius)**

Considered a vital tool for the protection and conservation of World Heritage Properties, the Operational Guidelines are of paramount importance for site managers who have a major and complex responsibility to ensure that any changes in the surroundings of the property do not have any negative impact on its Outstanding Universal Value. The case study of the Aapravasi Ghat will delve into the experiences of the heritage manager responsible for the management and monitoring of the Buffer Zone of the site, particularly when dealing with development pressures and implementation of the 2011 Recommendation on the Historic Urban Landscape.

This session invites speakers from different international organizations to share their experiences and efforts in combating the natural and man-made disasters in heritage sites worldwide.

ENHANCING THE CAPACITY BUILDING IN RISK MANAGEMENT OF CULTURAL HERITAGE Lata Shakya (Co-chair Holder for the UNESCO Chair Programme on Cultural Heritage and Risk Management, Institute of Disaster Mitigation for Urban Cultural Heritage, Ritsumeikan University, Japan)

In recent years, escalating climate change and conflicts have intensified global disasters. Ritsumeikan University's UNESCO Chair on Cultural Heritage and Risk Management program seeks to boost capacity through an International Training Course (ITC) for vital disaster risk management plans, essential for cultural heritage preservation. From its start in 2006 until 2023, the ITC has trained 193 professionals from over 75 countries, fostering a distinctive ITC family network. This presentation will emphasize the significance of networking in capacity-building programs, focusing on the course's evolution in addressing the challenges of cultural heritage protection.

OWHC EMERGENCY PROGRAMME FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF NATURAL AND MAN- MADE DISASTERS

David Johnson (OWHC Consultant Architect and Expert in Post-War Damage Assessment and Reconstruction)

An introduction to the 'Emergency Programme' being developed by the OWHC for the management of natural and man made disasters experienced through armed conflict, flood, fire, earthquake, and other extreme environmental situations. The programme aims first to assist member cities and their site managers to identify the risks that particularly affect them and then to explore methods of prevention, reaction and the longer term management of those risks. The process is being developed through interview and site workshops with cities who have experienced crisis situations, and by testing the methodology in Pilot Projects in representative cities.

ALIPH'S SUPPORT TO HERITAGE SITES IN EMERGENCIES

Elke Selter (Programs Director, International Alliance for the Protection of Heritage in Conflict Areas, ALIPH)

The ALIPH Foundation was created as an international organization, based in Switzerland, with the aim to provide rapid support to heritage sites in emergencies. RESOURCES FOR SITE MANAGERS IN THE ASIA-PACIFIC REGION: CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRAMMES BUILT ON JAPANESE EXPERIENCES

Wakiya Kayoko and Tamar Meladze (Cultural Heritage Protection Cooperation Office, Asia-Pacific Cultural Centre for UNESCO, ACCU Nara)

Every year since 2000, the Cultural Heritage Protection Cooperation Office, Asia-Pacific Cultural Centre for UNESCO (ACCU Nara) has been organizing fully funded training courses targeting young and mid-career site managers, architects, conservators, archaeologists, and museum curators engaged in cultural heritage protection in the Asia-Pacific region. Either by inviting the participants in Japan or sending the Japanese experts to target countries, in the past 24 years, ACCU has been providing opportunities for heritage practitioners to expand their knowledge, encourage questions and new ideas, and establish regional networks through engaging in open dialogues with Japanese experts and each other. Our presentation will share various collaboration and capacity-building opportunities of ACCU for the site manager communities and heritage professionals from the Asia-Pacific countries.

INTANGIBLE CULTURAL HERITAGE PERSPECTIVES FOR HERITAGE MANAGEMENT: INTRODUCING INITIATIVES OF IRCI

Tsuji Takashi and Nojima Yoko (International Research Centre for Intangible Cultural Heritage in the Asia-Pacific Region, IRCI)

The purpose of this presentation is to examine effective safeguarding of cultural heritage, by emphasizing the importance of 'intangible' aspects of heritage through introducing the initiatives by IRCI. IMPLEMENTATION OF REGIONAL FRAMEWORK ACTION PLAN FOR THE ASIA AND PACIFIC REGION (2022-2030)

Himalchuli Gurung (Chief of Asia and the Pacific Unit, World Heritage Centre, UNESCO, Paris)

The World Heritage Committee, at its extended 45th session (Riyadh, 2023) examined the Third Cycle Periodic Report for Asia and the Pacific and adopted the Regional Framework Action Plan for Asia and the Pacific (2023-2030). The World Heritage Committee encouraged all States Parties to widely disseminate the main outcomes of the Periodic Reporting exercise in the region among all relevant World Heritage stakeholders. The Committee also encouraged States Parties to appropriate the Regional Framework Action Plan, integrate it into national and sub-regional heritage policies and strategies, and ensure its implementation. States Parties are therefore invited to initiate or further pursue actions and activities that contribute to the priorities highlighted in this Regional Framework Action Plan, which will be the guiding strategic document for the implementation of the World Heritage Convention in the region for the coming seven or more years.

HOW CAN THE WORLD HERITAGE LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME BE USEFUL FOR SITES AND SITE MANAGERS?

Sarah Court (Independent heritage specialist)

The World Heritage Leadership (WHL) programme is a partnership between ICCROM, IUCN and the Norwegian Ministry of Climate and the Environment in collaboration with the World Heritage Centre and ICOMOS. It is a capacity-building programme, aiming to improve conservation and management practices for culture, nature and people. The programme adopts a wider view of the totality of conservation practice. With knowledge resources on management, management effectiveness assessment, disaster risk management, and impact assessment, the programme can provide technical assistance in building the capacity of your site management staff and community of people you work with across different institutions and authorities. From connecting individual professionals as participants to courses, the Programme also designs and implements tailor made training programs for sites, institutions and national and regional systems, creating a learning network of heritage professionals.

ICOMOS CHARTERS FOR CULTURAL HERITAGE PROFESSIONALS

The quality of conservation decisions depends heavily on the principles on which they are based. Among the sources of such principles, the Venice Charter of 1964 has long been the most influential one. However, over the last five decades, ICOMOS has developed various other "charters and other doctrinal texts" covering a wide range of conservation topics and issues reflecting the collective values of global and regional heritage professionals. These texts also reflect the evolution of shared thoughts as new charters are added or the existing ones are revised. This talk presents an overview of the ICOMOS Charters and discusses how heritage professionals, including site managers, can make use them to enhance their conservation decision-making.

PROTECTION OF WORLD HERITAGE AS A POLITICAL TOOL FOR DEVELOPMENT Karl Anders Karlsson (Manager-Public Officer, Vega Municipality, Vegaøyan-The Vega Archipelago, Norway)

World Heritage affects both change and development and World Heritage must take the lead and show the way. But are we robust enough politically? Do we understand the responsibility and are we given enough funding to manage the challenge? The protection of World Heritage is threatened in many ways. Threats that are both longand short-term. Threats directly and indirectly caused by political decisions. Handing over World Heritage, in better condition, to our next generations takes political bravery. We just need to agree on how brave!

QHAPAQ ÑAN: ANDEAN ROAD SYSTEM AT THE CROSSROADS BETWEEN **CONSERVATION AND POLITICAL CHALLENGES**

Diego Sberna (Site Manager, Qhapag Ñan - Andean Road System, World Heritage Site, Argentina).

In Argentina, the holistic management and conservation of a World Heritage site is usually a complex matter, especially when it comes to obtaining funds for its implementation in a country on the verge of economic hyperinflation. However, participatory management mechanisms with the local community (farmers and indigenous peoples) allowed us to overcome these inconveniences to guarantee the protection of a property such as the Ohapaq Ñan - Andean Road System inscribed on the World Heritage list since 21 June 2014. The conservation and political challenges are constant, but the effort is worth it to preserve its OUV for future generations but also in memory of our ancestors.

THE CHANGING ROLE OF VOLUNTEERS IN HERITAGE CONSERVATION AND **MANAGEMENT**

Fatiha Babuly (Founder and CEO, Perceive Research and Design, Bangladesh)

Oftentimes we heard that heritage sites lack resources such as staff, experts, space, funds and so on. Some of them require a big budget, planning and a long time to implement. But there are also some that can be resolved by innovative alliances, co-creation and small interventions at a time. One such alternative can be creating a platform for heritage fellows where they can volunteer their time or expertise to improve site management as an extended part of the existing system or reinventing the system. CULTURE-INSPIRED BOARD GAMES

Goh Choon Ean (Director, LUMA Creative Studio, Malaysia)
